Hello friends!


By the time you read this,

COA Service Honors Veterans,

First Responders

Christ Our Anchor Presbyterian Church in Cape St. Claire plans to commemorate Veterans Day with special services on Sunday.

One of the church members, Deacon for Life Walter Kolsch, "works tirelessly to seek donations of refreshments from local grocery stores and also personally invites all the local firehouses and such," according to Pastor Jessie Lowry.

Kolsch and a group of parishioners began the service, which includes the veterans and active military, police, first responders, and local Scouts, in 2002, in response to the friends and relatives lost as a result of Sept. 11, 2001.

Kolsch, a native of Long Island, and his late wife Dorothy, who was also a Deacon in the Church, moved to Arnold in 2001. After attending several area churches, they chose Christ Our Anchor because "the people were

so friendly and service-

oriented."

The church community supported Dorothy when Walter battled cancer in the early 2000s. When she was stricken with the same disease and passed away in 2009, after a four-year battle, according to Walter, "they helped me so much. I owe the Church." Today a bench dedicated to Dorothy sits under a tree in front of the building.

Kolsch helps with many activities, but he makes an extra effort for the Veterans Day services. This year he has obtained donations from Safeway, Giant, and Green Valley in order to buy refreshments for the reception. While there are two services, a 9:30 a.m. and 11 a.m., the earlier service is the larger one, he said.

"The service starts at 9:30; around 10:10, weather permitting, we come outside. The uniformed Scouts, who are also the greeters and ushers, lead the Pledge of Allegiance. Reverend Jessie leads a brief prayer service in memoriam on the property's Veteran's Memorial Garden, kept up by the volunteer group called God's Gardeners," Kolsch said. "Then, everyone sings 'God Bless America.' We have firefighters, uniformed military service people, and police officers. Last year, Cape St. Claire Volunteer Fire Company even brought the fire truck. It looks great with all the uniforms."





COA's Adult Mission Team Makes A Seventh Trip to New Jersey

Six mission team members made the rainy drive to Wall Township, NJ on Sunday, October 20 where we were housed at Camp Evans, a former Army facility dating back to

worked with
a group
called SBP,

which comes from their origins in Saint Bernard Parish, Louisiana. They employ AmeriCorps members who have been

trained in construction methods to be the onsite leaders to show us what needs to be done and provide necessary tools and instruction as needed.

On this trip we worked at three homes damaged during Super Storm Sandy: One in Long Branch, one in Union Beach and one in Keansburg. The home in Union Beach got the most attention with almost 200 of the 300 total man-hours our team put in during the week. Putting up

sheetrock and mudding took up the majority of the time along with clean up and painting. Mike Elliott from Prince of Peace Presbyterian Church joined our team this trip and his mastery of mudding the sheetrock proved invaluable.

Three of us worked at a refurbished home in Long Branch for the first three days doing punch list items such as painting, caulking, cleaning and in the process got two upstairs bedrooms ready for final inspection. Four of us spent Thursday working outside at a home that needed mold remediation before interior work could begin. We put massive amounts of construction debris and yard waste into a dumpster, raked, and mowed leaving the property looking good.

Beginning last September 1 through the end of August, we earned \$795.01 during our first year in the Graul's Receipt program! Thanks to all who have been able to join us at Broadneck Grill for a night out and in support of Christ Our Anchor's mission and outreach programs. I am pleased to announce that we raised over \$600 since August 15. This money is designated to go to the "World Central Kitchen" to support their efforts of feeding the People in the Bahamas. Here is a little more information about them:

"Just over five weeks after Category 5
Hurricane Dorian devastated the
northern islands of The Bahamas,
World Central Kitchen has served our 1
millionth meal.

With such extensive damage on multiple islands, we have extended our operations to deliver meals by whatever means necessary. In this case, that has included not only 30 vehicles, but also sending 5 helicopters, 2 seaplanes, a 220-foot ship, an amphibious vehicle, and 4 speedboats to more than 250 delivery locations."


COA To Try Out "Fun Day" School at 9:30 Service
