Dear friends at Christ Our Anchor and community,





COA's "Old Rugged Cross" Resurrected

A couple of weeks ago the cross that stands between our church signs near Green Holly Drive blew down due to rot and insect damage. This cross and the signs were erected in May of 2005 under the leadership of Norm Hall. The cross did a lot to make our church look like a religious facility instead of a library. Those helping to put up the new cross were Norm Hall, John Thompson, Hal Boyd, Dave Williams and Mike Henderson.

To resurrect the fallen cross, Mike Henderson and Tom Rorick built a prosthetic leg out of galvanized angle iron to replace the rotted portion. A

team of many helped to stand the cross up again on February 6 including Norm Hall, Mike and Joan Henderson, Rick and Linda

COA's Adult Mission Team—A Brief History

'm sure most of you remember Hurricane Katrina's striking Louisiana and Mississippi in August 2005. That disaster was the moving force behind the formation of COA's Adult Mission Team. Joan and I had Air Force friends living in the path of Katrina and after watching the pathetic government response to the disaster, we were ready to load up the truck and head down to assist our

where our friends had served. We stayed at a camp made up of corrugated plastic two-person tents, shower tents, porta-potties and a food tent. Many of the volunteer groups did the difficult job of mucking out flood-damaged houses and mold remediation, but since Tom had construction experience, our team did interior finish work at a house that was much further along in its restoration.



Over the years since this trip, COA Mission Teams have made 12 more trips to Mississippi and Louisiana and 6 trips to New Jersey where Super Storm Sandy struck in 2013. We help people whose insurance didn't fully cover their repairs or who had been ripped off by shady contractors. Many homes in flood areas had to be raised 10 feet or more, which is very expensive. This is required in order to get homeowner's insurance. On many trips we are able to meet the owners of the houses we were working on and could hear firsthand the details of the storms and their struggles to get back into their homes.

On others the owners may have been living or working away from the house location, but we were still told about

friends. Since their damages were not that severe and they had family coming to help, we delayed our trip and

started looking for ways to provide assistance. COA Pastor Steve Tisinger put us in contact with Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA), who gave us several options where we could serve and help those affected by the storm.

In February 2006, six months after Katrina struck, Joan and I along with Tom McNeal and former member Jim Hall headed to Di'lberville, MS to help rebuild damaged homes. This site was chosen due to its proximity to Keesler Air Force Base, Biloxi, MS

their circumstances. We always feel good when we leave knowing we have helped people overcome a tragic event.

Our groups have numbered from 4 to 12 on the various trips and 22 different people have participated over the years. On the first trip I made to New Jersey, I met Bill Toner who is a member of the Paxton United Methodist Church in Harrisburg, PA. He goes on 8 to 10 mission trips a year with various mission teams and he expressed an

interest in joining the COA team for a future trip to New Orleans. He and several other members from his church have become regular members of our team. Bill is a retired contractor and we have learned much from him over the years. He also manages the group at his church that makes those delicious Easter eggs that I've been selling at COA to raise money for mission trips.

Besides preparing most of our meals during the week and keeping our lodging facilities cleaned up, we do all kinds of interesting work at the job sites. We have hung doors, installed siding, laid various kinds of flooring, hung drywall, tiled bathrooms, installed cabinets, trimmed around doors and windows, caulked and painted. There are job supervisors wherever we work that can show us how to do

jobs we are not familiar with and there are always jobs for all skill levels.

Our next trip is planned for the week of March 17 - 22 to Kinston, NC, where we will be rebuilding houses damaged by Hurricane Matthew and ensuing floods in 2016. WE DID IT!

The happiest people on earth are the people who have discovered the joy of giving.

The Generosity Team is happy to share the news that our final pledged amount for 2019 is \$255,012.00. At the annual COA congregational meeting we told you that we did not even match what we had for 2018; we were about \$2,000 short. However, some additional pledging after that meeting gave us our needed boost.

It is also with joy that we tell you that 22 pledgers increased their 2018 pledges while only 6 lowered theirs. We also have 8 new pledges this year. We did have 9 that dropped off from 2018 for a variety of reasons.

Altogether we have 58 pledges (2018 was 59) with a median pledge of \$2,400. Our average pledge after the 5 highest and 5 lowest are removed is \$3,684. Whatever amount pledged is very important to us, as Session uses that to realistically set a budget. They do factor in unpledged offering, but it is a more secure feeling when Elders know what people might plan to give. Any pledge is not a contract. It is

just an idea of what one might plan to give to COA. If circumstances or desires change, pledges can be changed or dropped (or added) at any time.

We also want to emphasize that we truly appreciate those who choose not to pledge but still give regularly. This is an important aspect of our income. We have a line for non-pledged offering in our budget. We try to set up a realistic but conservative amount there as we are not as sure of this income coming in as the pledged amounts. However, recently this portion of our giving has been generous and steady so that in the last few years we have listed this as a higher amount than in the past and are comfortable with doing so.

So, thank you to those who pledged and to everyone who is planning to make 2019 financially a good year for COA. Because, with that, we can joyfully go forward with God's work.

Your stewardship has the potential to influence lives, provide hope to others, and make an eternal difference.

ACT Door-Knocking Campaign For Safe and Affordable Housing by Darrell Nash

How can we move our world to a better place? There are many possibilities we may wish existed. One of these is by supporting a strong organization—Anne Arundel Connecting Together, known as ACT.

ACT is a county-wide organization whose members include more than 20 houses of worship and community groups. A primary basis of ACT is to find out from people who are affected by discrimination and lack of power, what their lives are like now and to build collective power around the solutions that will create change.

On March 30, we will be training for and conducting a Door-Knocking Campaign. This campaign that will be done in Annapolis and County communities that lack safe and affordable housing. We will learn how to hear the issues of concern directly from people rather than assuming we know what they are. I attended the first door-knocking training on January 12, and it was a real eye-opener for me to listen to persons living in such communities and learn how to

approach residents and what to say and not say.
