Women's Retreat Focuses on How to Weather the Storm

COA's Women's Spring Retreat was held from May 3 through May 5 at Shrine Mont Conference Retreat Center. Here is Anna Werntz's summary of the discussion over the course of the weekend.

Our theme this year was "Preparing for the Storm". We brought awareness on what our reactions might be during times of turmoil. Storms in our lives, come at us, sometimes several at a time, so we worked on creating a toolbox that would help us survive and make it to the rainbow at the other end.

At the beginning of the Storm we each developed our personal Toolbox:

- Practice using your tools
- Stress management is very important
- Self-care, such as making sure to eat, drinking to keep strength up, meditation
- Working on problem-solving skills
- Being aware that something is coming
- Praying and asking God for strength and wisdom
- Fasting, for help creating a bond with God.

When you reach the Eye of the Storm, we learned to replenish our toolboxes:

- Rest
- Get nourishment
- Organize yourself and your tools
- Be thankful for the break
- Continue to ask God for strength and wisdom

When the Storm is over, and you see the Rainbow:

- Be thankful
- Rebuild
- Replenish your toolbox
- Grow by:
 - Learning from your mistakes
 - Changing what did not work

You now have gained experience.

Matthew 7:24--29 tells us:

"Therefore, everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock. The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house; yet it did not fall, because it had its foundation on the rock. But everyone who hears these words of mine and does not put them into practice is like a foolish man who build his house on sand. The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell with a great crash." When Jesus had finished saying these things, the crowds were amazed at his teaching, because he taught as one who had authority, and not as their teaches of the law.

So, through prayer and love, God is with us and he is going to remind each of us to be courageous and speak to our storms with authority. So, go, live your life holding onto God through all your storms. In Christ's name, Amen.



COA Mission Team Provides Relief From Hurricane Florence to Kinston, NC Area

ine volunteers set off for Kinston, NC on March 17 for a week-long mission trip to help residents recover from Hurricane Florence and flooding in 2016. We worked with the Kinston Area Recovery Effort (KARE) at three locations in Lenoir County. At the first home we did a variety of punch list

tasks to finish up a project that had been going on for several months. This included trim work, painting, hanging light fixtures and several other finishing touches.

The second project was a trailer home that needed the entry steps and porch beefed up and rebuilt, the front door replaced and rotted areas of the kitchen floor replaced and new flooring installed. A new roof was put on a shed at the third location and some roof repairs made to the house.

This was the twentieth mission trip for the COA Team and the first to North Carolina. Volunteers included Steve and Dotty Sellers from Harrisburg, PA, Tom Rorick, Linda Link, Terry DelPrete, Mike and

Joan Henderson and Bob and Paula Kilgore who were on their first mission trip. All the home owners that we worked with were extremely grateful for the service we provided and we left knowing that we had made a difference in their lives while doing God's work.

Our next mission trip is planned for October 20–25, back to New Jersey to continue rebuilding after Super Storm Sandy.
