To my wonderful COA family and community,

At the end of February, we are coming soon to another season of Lent! This always coincides with the coming of Spring, and that is no accident. New life is on the way, but just as with the season of Winter, sometimes we have to go through a time that seems colder, darker and even lonelier to get there. In this holy season, there are any number of ways that you can deepen your walk with God.

Join in church on Sunday.
 During Lent, I will be preaching a <u>sermon series</u> <u>called THINGS JESUS WAS NOT.</u> This series will continue on in the gospel of Mark and help us to examine our expectations of what our savior should

look like as compared with what Jesus actually came to do and to be for us. Many of our concepts of these things in the series are based on values of our world and culture and not on Jesus values. The series will follow this timeline:

People like those in Anne Arundel Connecting Together — ACT. COA is a member of this new and innovative group making change in our county.

ACT was named the "2019 Non-Profit Partner of the Year" by the Anne Arundel County Affordable Housing



Coalition. This recognition was because of our huge win of getting a Fair Housing Law passed in this county after listening to thousands of people when we went knocking on doors.

In 2019, ACT continued the good work of uniting people:

- Won a Fair Housing Law in Anne Arundel County
- Organized residents in Woodside Gardens to get safe, clean, and healthy homes
- After winning a faster timeline for lead testing in Anne Arundel County schools in 2018, kept tabs on safe implementation
- Took on Gun Violence using the market-based Do Not Stand Idly By national program
- Got commitments from County Executive Steuart
 Pittman and Mayor Gavin Buckley to help lead a
 new national Gun Safety Consortium for gun
 safety technology to address issues of illegal guns,
 gun violence and suicides
- Stood witness against hate when our sisters and brothers were attacked because of their race or religion
- Trained more than 200 leaders across the county to lead change

ACT won't slow down in 2020. The unity we have been building — one relationship at a time — is driven by





real needs. We will address systemic issues in housing, education, mental health, jobs, criminal justice, and transportation. Will you commit to working on one of these issues this year?

They came and they were met at the door by Hal and Mary Jane Boyd with smiles and warm welcome. They next were invited to an Eight is Enough dinner by Joan and Mike Henderson, and friendships began to grow. Dotty loved this and after that called us her church.

Walter started doing volunteering when he joined the Deacons in 2010. This helped him continue to move forward after Dotty passed, and really has never stopped. He sees his work in the church as a blessing but mostly as a calling. The church was right by his side when Dotty passed away, and later when he was diagnosed with cancer, so it's his way of paying it forward. It is who Walter is.

As Walter says, "The coffee hour helps me feel like I am serving the people and God wants me to do that. Working with Gods Gardner's I feel

like I am helping to keep the garden beautiful for God. I feel like it is an honor to serve communion, I take communion at first service for me, and the second service is for Dotty. Volunteering keeps me moving and I feel closer to God."




Stewardship Update

COA's Christian Education Program Continues to Grow

As the population of families with young children attending COA is increasing, I am excited to announce that COA is expanding the Children's Christian Education programming. In addition to our weekly 11:00 a.m. service FUN-Day (Sunday) School classes, we are currently piloting a once-a-month FUN-Day School class for children age 4 through 5th grade during the 9:30 a.m. traditional service. Children will stay in service until the Children's Message and then depart for FUN-day school (just like the 11:00 a.m. program). Mark your calendars on the second Sunday of the month for the 9:30 a.m. service FUN-Day school class: January 12 / February 9 / March 8 / May 10 / June 14 (none in April for Easter). Also, COA Nursery is now available for children (newborn to age 4) during both of our services (9:30 a.m. AND 11:00 a.m.).

The children of COA need YOU! Both the FUN-Day School and Nursery programs are cooperative-style programs and rely on adults to volunteer and share their time, talents, and love with the children in our congregation. For Nursery, adults just need to come and assist the COA Nursery Worker with the little ones. For FUN-Day School volunteers, curriculum, materials, and instruction guidance will be

provided by the COA Christian Education Team.

We continue to use the "Living The Word" Sunday School curriculum that follows Pastor Jessie's Narrative Lectionary sermon series. Each week there are a variety of activity choices for the teacher to select from to create a fun and meaningful lesson. COA's AED Could Save Lives



Automated External Defibrillators (AED) can save lives during sudden cardiac arrest. COA has an AED for just such emergencies located outside the kitchen next to the men's bathroom. There is a sign in the narthex to help locate the device in the event of

an emergency. This AED is designed so that anyone can use it, even without training. Instructions on how to use the AED are located in the box so anyone can find and follow the directions.

We hope we will never need this lifesaving device, but it is available if needed before emergency personnel arrive. Remember, in the event of an emergency, always call or (if possible) have someone else call 911.
