Women's Retreat Theme Is On Mending Fences by Anna Werntz

COA's Women's Spring Retreat this year was held from May 4–6 at Shrine Mont Conference Retreat

Center in Orkney Springs, VA. Our theme this year was about Mending Our Fence. The traditional Mending Fences ask us to mend the relationships in our lives that are broken, such as apologize to anyone that you hurt, or to ask forgiveness from any one to whom you did wrong. This was not what we worked on.

Rather, we worked on mending ourselves, so we can become one with God and our surroundings and be ready to receive what the Lord is asking of us. When our personal fence is missing a post, or one is

broken, this weakens our ability to hear, see or

know what God is asking us to do. For example: I ignored a pain that I was having in my hip and eventually my body said enough is enough and I went down to the floor. I now have to do many extra

things to fix this problem and it took twice as long because I waited for my body to stop me in my tracks before I listened. I was not able to focus my attention on my daycare, family, church obligations, and my time with God, due to doctor appointments, physical therapy, MRIs, and x-rays. I also had no



motivation or strength to accomplish tasks without pain. My fence was broken in many ways.

Always keep your fence whole and your link to God will stay connected, don't ignore yourself. One passage from the Bible that we used was Ezekiel 47:12:

Fruit trees of all kinds will grow on both banks of the river. Their leaves will not wither, nor will their fruit fail. Every month they will bear because the water from the sanctuary flows between them. Their fruit will serve for food and their leaves for healing.

If there is no water for the fruit trees they will wither, and no fruit will grow. The trees will be useless. No life to share. We need to make sure that we are running our best.

- ☐ On April 29, Commissioned Lay Pastor Jay Garvin from Harundale Presbyterian helped kick off our Mental Health Awareness month with a sermon that shared deeply and courageously of how his own call to ministry is tied to his family's struggle with addiction.
- ☐ On May 6, Pastor Jessie's message for worship asked the question---what does scripture have to say about mental health and how can Christians help rather than hurt?
- □ On May 15, the committee offered to COA and the community a presentation on mental health support in our county, attended by 22 people. The presenter was Fred Delp, the Director of Anne Arundel County NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness).
- ☐ Throughout the month, resources on mental health and addiction were made available in the narthex on the bulletin board and an adjoining table. These are available for everyone to take for their own education or to use in a workplace or in the community.
